COVID-19 Update

The District & Holy Name Medical Center co-hosted a Pediatric Vaccine Clinic on November 30 at BFMS. This event was highly successful, with 97 children receiving their first of two shots. The second shot will be administered at the school on December 21.

With the latest variant (Omicron) in several states, including New Jersey, we strongly encourage everyone to get vaccinated or get their booster shot. The District is already experiencing an increase in cases - including "breakthrough" cases in staff. Ms. Corallo, our Director of Community Relations, has already spoken to Holy Name. We have scheduled an additional pediatric clinic held on January 10, 2022 (more information will be coming soon). She is also exploring a path to offer booster shots and COVID-19 testing for our staff (NOTE: Testing recommended before everyone returns to work in January). Thank you to Holy Name Hospital and the Township for their partnership and help and support during this past year.

Curriculum & Instruction

December 6 Professional Development Day - The District held its second professional learning day. Sessions included a range of topics, such as: Science Instruction based on Phenomena, Supporting Social and Emotional Learning in the Writer's Workshop, Strategies for Differentiating Mathematics Instruction, Curating Library, and Media Resources on Destiny and Teaching Language using Total Physical Response Strategies. We were especially enthusiastic to partner with the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History for our secondary social studies professional development. Teachers will now have access to all of the rich instructional resources shared by the Institute.

All 25 sessions were carefully curated by the instructional supervisors and administrators to match the data that has recently been analyzed from both the Start Strong Assessment and Star Assessment. These sessions reaffirm the District's commitment to providing timely and relevant professional learning opportunities to our teachers and certificated staff members, especially as we look to recover from the health-related closure.  Language Arts/ English - Students in kindergarten and first grade have shifted to a multisensory, systematic reading foundations skills program that emphasizes: phonemic awareness, phonics/word study, reading fluency, comprehension, handwriting, and spelling. This

multisensory approach engages visual, auditory, kinesthetic, and tactile activities to enhance learning and memory. Because of distance learning, the District wanted to ensure that our youngest readers and writers have the opportunity to engage in structured, multisensory literacy learning, which ensures that they have the requisite literacy skills needed to be successful readers and writers. - Science Eleven K-12 Science teachers and the Science Supervisor attended two of five
 professional development sessions on the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS), learning
 how to support students as they investigate phenomena in the science classroom. The
 professional development modeled how Next Generation Science Standards-aligned instruction
 should look using Disciplinary Core Ideas to construct explanations for natural phenomena.
 Teachers also learned practices for engaging students in performance tasks.
- Technology Two Whittier Elementary School special education teachers were provided professional development in the use of 3D printing technology and 3D modeling software, and online resources. The two teachers immediately used what they learned and implemented the 3D printers and the 3D modeling software with their students.
- Gifted and Talented The Teaneck Academically Gifted Program is currently in full swing. In September, 5th-grade students in both middle schools universally took the Cognitive Abilities Test (CogAt), which helped further identify students for the 5th Grade Junior Great Books and 5th Grade Advanced Math Seminar programs. TAG Elementary teachers also began in-person enrichment classes for all 1st and 2nd-grade students once every 6 days. Plans are to introduce in-person enrichment for Kindergarten classes beginning in February 2022. In November, a total of 77 3rd & 4th-grade students were identified and invited to participate in extended services in Mathematics and Reading.
- Humanities / Social Studies On December 6, grades 7-12 Social Studies teachers and the Humanities Supervisor attended a PD with the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History focusing on the Teaching Literacy through History approach where they learned a series of integrated literacy skills and tools for using primary sources in the classroom that directly benefit student performance and understanding. In addition, High School teachers have started to design new lessons based on the Inquiry Design Model. An inquiry design lesson is where students analyze historical evidence in order to investigate problems or scenarios, where there is not a straightforward answer but one requiring students to form and test hypotheses to evaluate historical events and developments. This mode of inquiry will soon be introduced in middle schools.
- Visual and Performing Arts The Teaneck Public School District is proud to announce our new Fourth Grade Saturday Instrumental Music Program that will provide fourth-grade students the opportunity to receive instrumental music instruction on Flute, Clarinet, Saxophone, Trumpet, Trombone, Violin, Viola, Cello, and Percussion. The program will run from January to May and conclude with a concert to celebrate our students' accomplishments. Parents can fill out the Saturday Instrumental Interest Form by December 20. The form can be found Here. Additionally, our Fine Art teachers are providing students in grades 3-12 the opportunity to enter the 2022 Aviation Art Competition. This year's theme is "Design your perfect aircraft." More detailed information can be found Here.

Special Services

- 1. The Learning Ally Reading Solution The Learning Ally solution strives to improve literacy outcomes for students with dyslexia and other learning disabilities through early identification and intervention. The Learning Ally Solution includes:
 - a. Two (2) year enrollment for a complete site license (75% subsidized by NJ Education Department; 25% to be funded by Teaneck);
 - b. Professional learning services for administrators and educators;
 - c. 24/7 unlimited access to the Learning Ally online library of 80,000+ human-read audiobooks, including titles with highlighted text, available on iOS (iPad, iPod Touch, iPhone), Android (version 5.0 and higher), MAC, PC, and Chromebook;
 - d. Educator Portal for progress monitoring and reporting of student reading data;
 - e. Customized resources based on individual needs analysis for every enrolled educator.
- 2. District-Funded Orton Gillingham (OG) certification initiative with Fairleigh Dickinson University The department of Special Education is partnering with FDU to certify 30 staff members in the 12 credit certification program based on The International Multisensory Structured Language Education Council (IMSLEC®). The cohort are anticipated to be as follows:
 - a. Cohort 1 15 staff members January 2022 Fall 2023 Orton Gillingham Teacher Certificate (12 credits)(program accredited at IMSLEC Teaching Level) - 19 staff applied for this cohort;
 - b. Cohort 2 15 staff members September 2022 May 2024 Orton Gillingham Teacher Certificate (12 credits)(program accredited at IMSLEC Teaching Level) 18 staff applied for this cohort;
 - c. Staff members have until December 10 to apply. Staff members who are selected will be notified on December 15.
- 3. NJDOE Systematic Change Facilitation Grant Update
 In partnership with the New Jersey Inclusive Education Technical Assistance (NJIETA), New
 Jersey Coalition for Inclusive Education (NJCIE), and Montclair University, the Department of
 Special Education and Hawthorne Elementary School launched an NJDOE fully-funded (nonmonetary/ no cost to Teaneck) school-based systematic change initiative. The initiative is a
 three to a five-year partnership that includes:
 - a. Onsite training and coaching to address the high rate of special education students placed in separate classes and separate schools;
 - b. Quarterly updates to district leadership on action plan progress.
- 4. Special Education Parent Advisory Group Upcoming Event
 The current structure of Teaneck's SEPAG is in a transitional phase from a District led group to
 become the more traditional, parent-led group. To that end, the Special Services department
 has been in contact with and made available to our special education parents, the SPAN Parent
 Advocacy Group Network. Special Education parents were invited to attend a workshop on
 November 10 entitled: "Starting and Running an Effective Special Education Parent Advisory
 Group (SEPAG)." At least one parent showed interest in leading the transition from a district-led
 group to a parent-led group existing with district support. The next meeting will be scheduled
 for January 2022.
- 5. Strengthening Staff Training Session Through CarePlus New Jersey
 The Department of Special Services, Nurses and the School Counseling Department facilitated a

healthy mind healthy body staff workshop around the following topics:

- a. The basics in understanding how to cope during the pandemic, and how this stress differs from other stressors and can lead to trauma in youth and the adults who support them.
- b. How to identify signs of distress in themselves as educators and support staff.
- c. Strategies staff can implement to assist students and themselves in managing stress related to grief, loss and staying socially connected to build resilience.

School Counseling Department

 - School Counselors will participate in the "Strengthening Staff Training Session" provided by CarePlus New Jersey with the Department of Special Services and Nurses.
 The focus will be on delivering strategies for supporting themselves while continuing to support students and families.

Over the last few weeks, the Technology Department started implementing a new security system for Bryant Elementary School, Whittier Elementary School, Hawthorne Elementary School, and Lowell Elementary School. The new security system will include brand new cameras, card access, and door buzzer systems in each building. This is the first year of our three-year project, and we plan to address the middle and high schools in the following two years.
