Coronavirus/COVID-19 Update

This has been a challenging and sad month for our Teaneck community. On behalf of Teaneck Public Schools, our thoughts and prayers go out to the families who have lost a loved one and to those who are suffering with the virus at home or who are in a hospital in critical condition. These are very uncertain and scary times, and I truly hope that our families are taking advantage of the various mental health services that we provide to our school community. If you need more information about these services, please reach out to your child's school counselor or principal.

Still as with most tragic events, we always see people rise to the occasion and go above and beyond in trying to help serve the community that they love, as well as other Americans who are struggling through this very difficult time. For example, our Science Supervisor, Mr. Rolando Monserrat, in collaboration with Elias Sanchez (a 10th grade student) and other Teaneck staff community members including our PTO's, helped to create 340 face shields (using 3D printers) and donated them to Holy Name Medical Center. We also have a creative young student, Briana Andrade (3rd grade at Whittier), who took it upon herself to make bracelets and donate the \$240 proceeds to the Teaneck Volunteer Ambulance Corps. I realize there are many more examples of the great and compassionate work of our students and staff – and I remind everyone that if you have such an example and think it is worthy of acknowledgement, please send in your Teaneck Apple Award nominations to Ms. Terry Corallo, Director of Community Relations – tcorallo@teaneckschools.org.

Over this past month, I have been communicating weekly with our school community in order to make sure that our parents/guardians, staff and students are kept apprised of the latest developments — which often changed daily but certainly weekly. I am pleased to say that now that we have entered what I call "Phase 2" of our virtual learning plans our school community seems to be on a steadier path as we all adjust to this new norm.

Additionally during the first six weeks of our "stay at home" timeframe, we have distributed over 2100 meals and I want to remind everyone that we will continue to distribute free boxed lunches Monday-Friday at Teaneck High School from 11 am – 1 pm on the Cranford Avenue side (drive through and pick-up). I would like to note that during a recent webinar hosted by the New Jersey Department of Education's Office of School Preparedness and Emergency Planning – they were presenting beneficial and important information as our State is confronted by the many challenges imposed upon us by COVID 19) – Teaneck Public Schools' "drive-thru" set-up was selected as one of the three (3) best examples/practices for delivery of goods and services during the response to the COVID-19 pandemic. This is a collaborative effort of our food services, facilities, security and district staff. I want to express my appreciation to all who are involved in this important daily operation.

At this point, I know everyone wants to know "when will this end?" As the Governor noted this week, that remains unknown; but I assure everyone that we are planning ahead for several different scenarios. This includes offering a virtual Summer Bridge Program (more details on this will be released soon) to help our students with a transition to the next grade level. It also includes a final decision regarding

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our summer camp program (Camp K) for 2020. We realize that a possible cancellation will be disappointing to our children and their parents, but please note that the Township is facing the same decision regarding their summer recreation program. Health and safety of our children and staff must remain our top priority. To that end, we continue to receive updates from our town, county, state and/or federal officials on the status of this virus, along with restrictions put into place in order to limit undue pressure on our healthcare providers and to keep our community healthy and safe.

I will continue to keep our school community updated as needed; but I want to encourage everyone to please follow our district Facebook page (@TeaneckPublicSchoolDistrict) and our district website (www.teaneckschools.org). We are a strong community and we will get through this together.

NJSLA & Other Spring State Testing

As previously announced, the New Jersey Student Learning Assessments for English Language Arts and Mathematics and Science (NJSLA-ELA/Math/Science) ACCESS for ELLs, and the Dynamic Learning Maps (DLM) assessments have been cancelled due to the pandemic. As this was a decision that applies statewide, there will be no make-up testing for this year, and the requirement for a statewide assessment of eighth grade students is waived as well as the statutory graduation assessment requirement is waived for any twelfth-grade student, including the portfolio assessment.

Preschool Update

In March, I informed you that the district received notice from the State that we will receive our final PEEA extension to proceed with 309 general education students (219 are in-district students and 90 allocated for providers per the State Aid Summary) for the 2020-2021 school year. By shifting the Kindergarten classes from Bryant School to the new Theodora Smiley Lacey School, we will now have 23 pre-k (15 General Ed Pre-K classes and 8 PSD classes) at Bryant. We will also continue to have preschool seats at our Teaneck Early Learning Center at Christ Episcopal Church and at AUCC Academy. Families who are currently in our pre-k 3 program will automatically move up to pre-k 4. Letters have been distributed to the families who applied for 2020-2021 (along with email notifications and follow-up phone calls), and I am pleased to report that with this increase in capacity, everyone who applied (208 applications received) was informed that they will receive a pre-k seat for their child. Actual *placement* letters however are currently targeted to release in June. For our new families who have received a pre-k placement, they will eventually need to complete the full registration process. More details on this will be provided to those families when they receive their placement letter.

Theodora Smiley Lacey School Update

During our March Board meeting, the Board unanimously approved a resolution renaming the building formerly known as "Eugene Field" to become the "Theodora Smiley Lacey School". For the 2020-2021 school year, the newly renovated Theodora Smiley Lacey School will house nine kindergarten classrooms, servicing most of our kinder population (approximately 180 students).

Renovation is underway and making steady progress. Selective demolition is complete. All new walls have been framed and rough plumbing & electrical is complete. The Contractor is installing insulation and drywall on the second floor walls. The new heating piping is also being installed.

Due to the recent health crisis, we have postponed our special announcement ceremony that we had scheduled for this evening. An official naming ceremony will take place once the renovated school opens in September.



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With regard to kindergarten registration for the 2020-2021 school year, we had planned to complete this by April 30; however, we have extended the deadline due to the pandemic until further notice. Kindergarten placement will be at your child's neighborhood school or at the new Theodora Smiley Lacey School (formerly known as Eugene Field - One Merrison Street). To register your child for kindergarten (new residents only), send an email to rantinori@teaneckschools.org. More information will be forthcoming.

125th Teaneck Anniversary Celebration Postponed

Teaneck Public Schools and the Township of Teaneck have partnered to host a special "125th Anniversary of the Township" Gala. This event was scheduled to be held on November 19, 2020 but due to COVID-19 and the uncertainty of what lies ahead, we have decided to postpone this event until 2021. Curriculum & Instruction

The Department of Curriculum and Instruction has been busy teaching and learning in the District's virtual classrooms. Administrators have been visiting Google classrooms and reviewing lessons plans and upcoming assignments. Our teachers have produced wonderful recordings of teaching while also engaging in Google Meets. To support this learning, please continue to review the District's website where resources continue to be uploaded and updated. Also, look out for your school's next town hall meeting.

School Counseling Department

- The Mental Health Initiative is Back! Elementary & Middle Schools The Mental Health Services initiative have resumed providing support to students in grades k-8. Telehealth sessions are conducted utilizing Google Meets. Parents can access these services by sending an email to your student's counselor.
- Support Services The School Counseling department is continuing to provide support to students and families during this time. Mrs. Golding-Cooper facilitates weekly meetings with the members of the district "Support Staff" (all counselors, F.O.R.U.M staff and the SAC) to discuss families that are being impacted during the pandemic and community resources available. Mrs. Golding-Cooper coordinates services to families with students in more than one school as well as providing resources and support to counselors working with families experiencing difficulties. All Elementary Outreach Workers, School Counselors, and F.O.R.U.M staff are available during school hours via Google Meets. Counselors also have Google Voice numbers to contact students and families. Parents and students are encouraged to email their counselor for support.
- Counselor Google Classrooms All School Counselors (5-12) and Elementary Outreach Workers have created Google Classrooms to continue to provide support to their students. Classrooms include grade level content ranging from Mindfulness activities, motivational posts, academic guidance/support and college and career readiness information. Counselors are also hosting Google Meets on a variety of topics.

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- Future Scheduling for Grades 5 11 In order to assure that all students in grades 5 11 will be properly scheduled for the 2020 2021 school year, we will be doing this process electronically due to school closures beginning April 20. The middle and high school families received communication regarding the process. Information including an instructional video are posted on the "Scheduling" tab on the "School Counseling" page.
- Fairleigh Dickinson University (FDU) Partnership Update FDU has continued the Saturday Programs virtually. Teaneck students participated in GEE (8th Grade girls), TEOP, CSEOP, and META
 - Summer College Credit Program- The opportunity to once again earn FDU college credits this summer is being explored. More information will be available in the upcoming weeks.

Special Education Town Hall Meeting 4/8/20

In response to the COVID-19 health-related school closure, the department hosted a town hall meeting on Wednesday, April 8, 2020 to outline how we will continue special education services to our students. We discussed:

- Access to remote learning via Google Meet for Virtual IEP Meetings and Related Services for Special Education Students and families took effect on March 25, 2020.
- Special education teachers and related service providers continue to ensure that resources are varied (e.g., audio, multiple texts) and aligned to the goals in each students' IEP.

The special education department held its first Board of Education Special Education Committee meeting on Thursday, April 23, 2020. Board of Education members Clara Williams, Gerald Reiner, Denise Saunders, and Sarah Rappoport joined Dr. Irving and the special education administration in a vibrant discussion about virtual learning and the impact on students with special needs, components of the special education strategic plan and the department's accomplishments for the 2019-2020 school year.

- To facilitate student learning during this health related school closure, paraprofessionals have completed various professional development modules, some of which now include Google related tools. Chromebooks will be distributed to paraprofessionals with the goal of them beginning to enter Google Classrooms by May 4, 2020.

Technology

In preparation for moving to an online learning platform, The technology department was able to deploy over 600 Chromebooks to our elementary school students. In addition to the Chromebooks, we also deployed over 100 hot spots for any families that do not have access to reliable internet access in their homes. Our 1:1 Chromebook initiative has now expanded to grades 1-12.

The technology department has a Chrome depot setup for any devices that need to be repaired to swapped. They are available at the Teaneck High School Cranford side parking from 11 AM to 1 PM every day. Benjamin Franklin Middle School

- The majority of March as been consumed with preparing our school for distance learning to ensure the continuity of instruction for our learners. Due to the school closure, many of our programs were cancelled due to the effects of COVID-19.
- Benjamin Franklin Middle School participated in distributing food, Chromebooks, and packets
 for students at Teaneck High School daily during the closure. We also donated Personal
 Protective Equipment (PPE) collectively with other schools to provide the needed assistance and
 support to essential workers in the Teaneck area, specifically, Holy Name Hospital.
- Working in concert with Mr. Rolando Monserrat, Science Supervisor, the school donated its 3D Printers to assist with the creation of face shields to protect workers involved in fighting COVID-19. Our Media Specialist, Ms. Hina Mehta, worked at home using one of the school's 3D printers to assist with this task.

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- On April 7, our schools hosted its Virtual Town Hall Meeting for the school community to share how our remote learning will look beginning April 13.
- A Google Classroom was created for parents to learn about the remote learning platform and provided real-time feedback for parents adjusting to this form of teaching and learning.
- BFMS launched a Teacher "Geek of the Week" Program to commend educators for going above and beyond using technology and SAMR Model related strategies to promote virtual learning and preserve high-level instruction during our school closure.

Thomas Jefferson Middle School

- TJMS staff attended virtual faculty meetings on March 27 and April 17.
- The TJMS PTO held their monthly meeting online on Zoom on Tuesday, April 21. Since all Spirit
 Week activities have been cancelled, the PTA has decided to give all of the 8th grade graduates
 a complimentary yearbook.
- TJMS administration hosted a Virtual Town Hall Meeting on Monday, April 27. through Google Meet to answer any questions parents/guardians have about the Google Classroom platform.
- Report cards for the third marking period will be available through Skyward on April 29.

Teaneck High School

- The THS School Counseling Department initiated College Fridays. Staff members wore the apparel of colleges that are meaningful to them. Teachers and students decorated doors with college and university paraphernalia. The School Counseling Department awarded a teacher with a gift card to Dunkin Donuts for being the first to decorate her door.
- Department supervisors lead content meetings to plan for extended learning sessions. Two
 weeks of lessons were initially created. The content supervisors then held Google meets
 conferences to develop two more weeks of lessons.
- Prior to spring break teachers planned to move to Google Classroom as the instructional model for distance learning. The high school teachers were prepared for this transition.
- THS held a Town Hall meeting on April 7 with close to 200 people on the Zoom call. All of the questions that were asked in the chat were answered.
- THS Survey answers indicate that teachers, students and parents are pleased with the move to a Google Classroom model of instruction. Student / Teacher contact time increased with the transition to Google Classroom. Teachers answered questions during their periods in writing or in Google Meet sessions.
- The Cranford Ave parking lot is being used to distribute lunches, Chromebooks and student instruments. Mrs. Moore sends out an email daily to report the numbers of people that pick-up lunches, Chromebooks, instruments and other items.
- THS held a second Town Hall meeting on April 28 at 5 pm.
